Guidelines for Reinstatement of the Sunday Obligation Effective the weekend of September 20, 2020

- If individual Catholics struggle with serious health concerns, are caring for an ill loved one, or are morally prevented from worshipping at Mass for a grave reason, this obligation does not apply.
- If individuals are frail due to illness or age and in their well-formed consciences believe that going into public places – including Sunday worship at Mass – would place their health or the health of their loved ones in serious jeopardy, they too are not bound by this obligation.
- Those with symptoms of illness such as cough or fever, even if not COVID-19 related, in the spirit of Christian charity, should remain home.

What to Expect at Mass

- Masks remain required. If a member of the faithful is not able to wear it, they will still be admitted.
- Temperatures will continue to be taken – either at the forehead or the wrist.
- Hand sanitizer and masks will remain available near the entrance of church.
- Holy water fonts will remain empty.
- Hard surfaces will continue to be wiped down between Masses.
- Hymnals will not be placed in pews. They continue to be available for your personal use (take home and bring back for each Mass).
- No longer restricted by percentage of people present for Mass. However, standards of social distance must be upheld and therefore may limit attendance.
- The faithful are encouraged to avoid crowding, especially in high-traffic areas (when entering or exiting the church, in the vestibule, etc)

Specific Provisions for the Parts of the Mass

- The celebrant and other ministers should remain more than 6 feet from the congregation during the entirety of the Mass, if possible.
- Music will continue to be offered by a cantor and a musician.
- Collections will continue to be collected in a basket at the entrances.
- Offertory procession of *bread and wine only* will resume.

The Distribution of Holy Communion

- The Precious Blood will not be distributed to the faithful.
- Those ministering communion must wear a mask and use hand sanitizer before and after distribution.
- Holy Communion will be received in the normal way, using a single file line.
