

Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: The last paragraph of this gospel passage is a little frustrating. Why would John not write down all the signs that Jesus did? It seems like more preservation of this story would be better! But the incompleteness of John's retelling reveals an important thing: we need each other. None of us holds the complete story of Jesus, but we all see him in different ways according to our various places in life. When we come together to share what we have seen of Jesus, we may begin to realize that he far surpasses our hopes for him. Our images of Jesus are always too small. Thomas, too, would have understood more of Christ had he trusted those who had experienced him differently.

To Experience: The first reading reveals what a community looks like when it has really encountered the risen Christ. It is hard to envision this today because we are so shaped by a society that values money above all else. Our capitalist and consumerist culture makes the early believers' common distribution of goods seem a wildly unattainable dream. But we are called to at least hold loosely to our possessions, being ready to distribute them to others when we encounter need in our neighbors.

- 1. How do you encounter the risen Christ? What evidence does Jesus give you of his presence and power?
- 2. What might you learn about Jesus from people who are different from you? Think of differences in age, culture, and vocation. How might you seek out others' stories of Jesus so that you might appreciate him more fully?
- 3. The first reading reveals an early church that holds all things in common. Shaped as we are by capitalism and consumerism, it is hard for us envision living in such a way, but what is one way you could loosen your grasp of possessions and share with those who are in need?

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

This month's prayer card is an act of "spiritual communion."

The practice of spiritual communion may be familiar to some older Catholics but unheard of by most younger Catholics.

Spiritual communion is the expression of desire to be in union with Jesus Christ, specifically to be in union with Christ <u>as if</u> one was receiving the Holy Eucharist.

There are a number of reasons to make an act of spiritual communion. In times and places of persecution, participation in the celebration of the Mass was often unavailable to most Catholics. Historically, this included times such as Poland under Communist rule. In present times, this includes Catholics in countries such as Saudi Arabia and China.

There are also places where the shortage of priests means that Mass is only available infrequently. Historically, this includes Catholics in early America. In present times, this often includes Catholics living in mission territories.

Recently, in our own time, when parishes were closed during COVID, many Catholics expressed a desire to receive Jesus in Holy Communion but were unable to receive Him.

No matter the reason why a Catholic may not be able to receive Holy Communion, they can always make an act of spiritual communion, and even make an act of spiritual communion multiple times a day.

Spiritual communion is not only for times of persecution, scarcity of priests, or epidemics. We should desire to always have Jesus dwelling in our hearts. For this reason, great saints of the Church have encouraged Catholics to frequently make acts of spiritual communion. Here are some examples:

"When you do not receive communion and you do not attend Mass, you can make a spiritual communion, which is a most beneficial practice; by it the love of God will be greatly impressed on you," St. Teresa of Avila.

"If we are deprived of Sacramental Communion, let us replace it, as far as we can, by spiritual communion, which we can make every moment; for we ought to have always a burning desire to receive the good God," St. John Vianney.

"What a source of grace there is in Spiritual Communion! Practice it frequently and you'll have more presence of God and closer union with him in your life," St. Josemaria Escriva.

"It is good to cultivate in our hearts a constant desire for the sacrament of the Eucharist. This was the origin of the practice of 'spiritual communion,' which has happily been established in the Church for centuries and recommended by saints who were masters of the spiritual life," Pope St. John Paul the Second.

The practice of spiritual communion is an effective way to prepare for Mass, and also to deepen a sense of God's presence throughout our day and our week.

A Notification from the Vicar General

"In recent years, it has become increasingly common for some Catholics to be married, without Church permission, in civil or quasi-religious ceremonies. There are a variety of reasons for this phenomenon, but



it must be stated that these ceremonies are not sacramental marriages. As Catholics, we uniquely believe that marriage is a sacrament, and because of this reality, we usually celebrate it in a parish church where the Christian community gathers to pray. In almost all cases, the only authentic celebrant of a Catholic marriage is a bishop, priest or deacon. Also occasionally seen today are Catholic laypeople who, acting on their own, organize, lead, or even witness, on the part of the state, the vows of the couple. These individuals do not represent the Catholic Church in performing marriages and have no religious authority to do so. Such ceremonies, although legally marriages in the state of Wisconsin, are not sacraments, and thus the couple has not received the Sacrament of Matrimony. If you have further questions about these important matters, please speak with your parish priest."

The Feast of Divine Mercy



St. Faustina Kowalska was a Polish nun who received mystical revelations in which Jesus showed her his heart, the source of mercy and expressed his wish that this feast was celebrated. Therefore, she is known as the messenger of Divine Mercy.

The Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments issued on May 23, 2000 a decree (at the suggestions of St. John Paul II) in which the feast of Divine Mercy would be celebrated each year on the second Sunday of Easter.






In order to celebrate this day, it is recommended to pray the Chaplet and Novena of the Divine Mercy, go to confession (after a deep examination of conscience), and to receive Holy Communion on the day of the Feast of Divine Mercy.

The main purpose of the Feast of Divine Mercy is to send the entire world an important message: God is merciful and He loves us all.

How can I live out the message of Divine Mercy throughout the year?

This message of Divine Mercy is not just intended for one Sunday. We should live this and embrace it daily. Our understanding of the mercy of Christ is key to our relationship with Him. It is also essential that we show mercy to others. In our culture, the idea of mercy has been lost. We demand that others pay the price for their wrongs. Rarely, do we forgive those who do not "deserve" or ask for for-

giveness. Mercy will be a form of evangelization. Others will surely notice when we show mercy with the love of Christ. We can do this by studying the <u>Spiritual and Corporal Works of Mercy</u> and making their practice a habit in our lives.

Pope Francis encouraged this practice when he announced this year as a Jubilee of Mercy. "It is my burning desire that, during this Jubilee, the Christian people may reflect on the *corporal and spiritual works of mercy*. It will be a way to reawaken our conscience, too often grown dull in the face of poverty. And let us enter more deeply into the heart of the Gospel where the poor have a special experience of God's mercy." You may also choose to recite <u>The Chaplet of Divine</u> <u>Mercy</u> daily or whenever possible. Finally, learn more about Divine Mercy: read the <u>Diary: Divine Mercy in My Soul</u>; watch the new film *Faustina: The Apostle of Divine Mercy* from Ignatius Press; listen to the teachings of <u>Fr. Michael Gaitley</u> on Divine Mercy and those of Pope Saint John Paul II. There are so many wonderful resources to help you grow in your understanding of the mercy Christ wants to reveal to you.

Don't just keep the good news of this mercy to yourself. Think back to last Sunday when you saw those people who only show up to Church on Christmas and Easter. Do you know some of those faces? Are they your neighbors, co-workers, friends or relatives? Invite them to come back to Mass again this Sunday. Share with them the power of mercy and the forgiveness that God desires to lavish on them through this feast day. Be the encouragement that someone else may need to enter into the doors of our Churches and receive the graces God wants to bestow. When we take the initiative to educate others about Divine Mercy Sunday and actively draw them into the celebration of the Eucharist, we will know that our own hearts are truly beginning to understand the message of mercy and love of the risen Lord.
