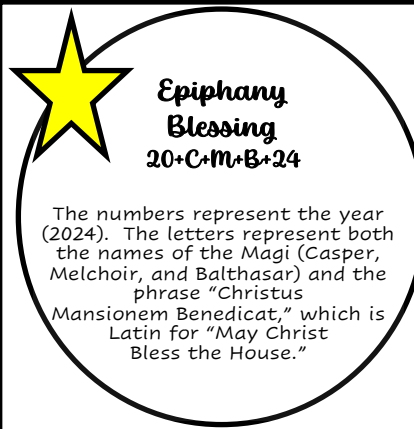

Thoughts for Today's Readings



To the Point: When the magi come to Jerusalem, they head for the palace; they came, after all, looking for a king. Their searching leads them ultimately to a much more ordinary abode. They trust that this is what

they were seeking, and they respond with joy and praise. What extraordinary trust—the humble life of Mary and Joseph does not look like the king they were expecting. The magi and the extraordinary trust stand in sharp contrast with King Herod. They are open to the workings of God in places and people foreign to them. He, on the other hand, clings so tightly to his power and title that he cannot see God's hand even as God fulfills promises to the people Herod purports to represent. The magi ask questions earnestly, driven by curiosity and passion. Herod makes inquiries maliciously, intending to maintain his hold on what was never really his. The magi give us an example of the wonders that can happen when we drop our defenses and receive God's presence in each other even when it does not appear as we would have expected.

To Experience: In this life, we do not always see the splendor that God has promised. It can be hidden under all the pain and brokenness still present in our world. But God has fulfilled these promises and continues to fulfill them. Like the magi, we might need to look in places we don't expect. God is present not in wealth and worldly splendor, but in humble family homes.

1. The magi come looking for Jesus, but they start by looking in the wrong places. Where might your expectations be keeping you from seeing the fullness of God's work?
2. Herod's wickedness has him clinging fast to power. What is a place in your life where you might need to let go of some power or control?
3. The magi finally encounter Jesus not in the palace they expected but just in a house. When have you encountered God in a surprising place?

Hear to Serve ...

PSALM 72 A PRAYER FOR THE KING

I strongly recommend reading and rereading the Responsorial Psalm for each Sunday Mass. Get out your Bible and look up the entire Psalm. The Psalms are filled with every human emotion and contain wisdom that is much needed in our world.

Psalm 72 begins as a prayer for Solomon and a hope for prosperity for his nation now and in the future. The Psalm is really much deeper than that. It is about the coming of the Messiah. It is a prayer of longing for the coming of the King of the Universe, the only King who can rule the whole world with wisdom, justice and mercy. It is a hope far beyond what a human ruler is capable of.

This is the hope that we have for our country. Isn't that what all people hope for in their countries throughout the world? We want our country to be lands of prosperity and abundance. We want leaders that rule with justice, wisdom, and mercy. As we talk about leaders ruling with justice, wisdom, and mercy, that just isn't for our political leaders, this includes our Church leadership as well.

In the world today it seems more prevalent than ever that there is poverty, injustices, wars, and corrupt leadership. There is a breakdown of families, a breakdown of people's faith in the Church and its leadership. While anxiety and stress seem to be on the rise, all these problems in society and in our lives have become holes that keep getting bigger and bigger.

Well, Solomon's reign did not go well, and Israel was split by civil war. Solomon's sin was that while he did love God, he didn't love God with his whole heart. God warned the Israelites not to marry people from other nations. Solomon didn't listen to God. He had many wives; he had wives that worshipped pagan gods and they corrupted Solomon into filling the holes in his life with idol worship.

Have we not seen world leaders get power hungry and instead of ruling their country with wisdom, justice, and mercy they become more concerned about their reputations? They seek personal wealth and power; they want to rule the world. History has shown us they will never be happy. They will never be satisfied.

In our personal lives, what pagan gods do we try fill the holes in our lives with ... bigger houses, bigger bank accounts, pleasures of the world?

We have to love God with our whole heart. Filling our lives with these pagan gods will never truly satisfy us. There will always be an emptiness in our lives. It's only when we let the only true King Jesus the Christ take control of our hearts and minds, then these holes will be filled and we will find peace. Our hearts and minds will become filled with an abundance of wisdom, justice, and mercy for our neighbor.

Let us pray for our world leaders; let us pray for our Church leaders; and let us pray for ourselves, that we have learned a lesson from Solomon. Let's take some time and rid ourselves of any idols in our lives. Then we can give our hearts and minds and lives to Jesus the Christ, the King of Heaven and Earth. He is the King of true justice and peace who will reign over us in His eternal Heavenly Kingdom. Amen.

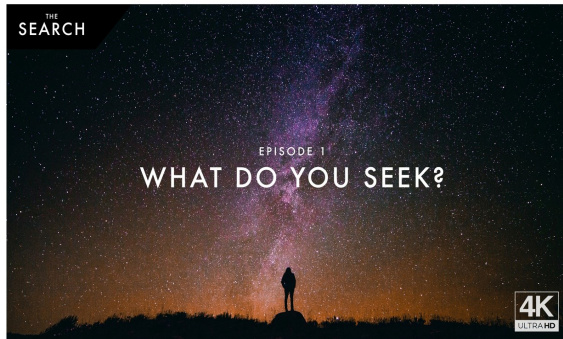

ENCOUNTERING JESUS IN THE EUCHARIST

Disciples Called to Worship

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

On August 28, 2022, Bishop Ricken released a pastoral letter entitled “Encountering Jesus in the Eucharist: Disciples Called to Worship.” A pastoral letter is an open letter sent by a bishop to the clergy and laity of his diocese. The purpose of a pastoral letter is to encourage positive developments in the local church or to place a greater emphasis on certain aspects of Church teaching, or to outline pastoral plans, or at times to admonish the diocese.

The letter, “Encountering Jesus in the Eucharist,” is the third part of the bishop’s “Disciples on the Way” initiative. It is also the diocesan participation in the national Eucharistic Revival that is currently underway. From November 2022 through June 2023, the pastoral councils of both parishes have studied the letter. I highly encourage every member of the parish to read the letter. It is linked on the parish homepage, and is available at <https://www.gbdioc.org/docman/office-of-the-bishop/1333-encountering-jesus-in-the-eucharist-pastoral-letter/file>. For those who prefer a hard copy, these will be provided upon request.

In the letter, the bishop highlights five practices to live the Mass. He calls these the “Five Alive Practices.” They are 1) participating in MASS, 2) preparing for Mass by praying LECTIO DIVINA, 3) extending the graces of Mass through EUCHARISTIC ADORATION, 4) returning to a right relationship with God through the Sacrament of Reconciliation (a.k.a. CONFESSION) and 5) drawing closer to Jesus through Mary by praying the ROSARY.

These five practices are basic, but we can only grow if we excel at the basics. One needs to walk before they run, and even crawl before they can walk. Many Catholics do not practice the basics, and some are not even familiar with them. So this is a call to return to the basics to build a solid foundation for future growth and renewal. Starting in January, each month the bulletin will present a focus on one of these “five alive practices.” We will be taking them in a different order, so that they align better with the liturgical seasons: January - MASS, February - LECTIO DIVINA, March - CONFESSION, April - EUCHARISTIC ADORATION, and May - the ROSARY.

These practices reinforce what we already know from experience, and from what the best studies teach us about characteristics of thriving Catholic parishes. Thriving Catholic parishes nurture a strong devotion to the HOLY EUCHARIST, and the BLESSED VIRGIN MARY. Thriving Catholic parishes encourage reading and understanding the Word of God, through Bible studies and the practice of LECTIO DIVINA. Thriving Catholic parishes also have a healthy practice of people going to CONFESSION.

There is no other life for the parish, except for the life that Jesus offers us through His Word and the Most Blessed Sacrament. By drawing closer to our Lord in the Eucharist, we will experience a deeper spiritual life, and greater life in our parishes. Remember the words that Jesus shared with his disciples at the Last Supper, “I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing” (John 15:5 ESV).

Part VI — “Five Alive” Practices To Live the Mass

1. Mass

For most Catholics, our primary contact with the life of our parishes will be at Sunday Mass. It is our opportunity to encounter Christ in the sacrament of Eucharist. As such, the Mass is a powerful instrument for evangelization, and every effort should be made to cultivate an environment that fosters intentional discipleship during Sunday Mass. Attention and care should be especially directed to the welcoming process, the music, the preaching and to the integration of families with young children into the community. Attention should also be given to bridging the gap between Sunday Mass and a life of discipleship. This means connecting Sunday to our everyday life.

The National Directory for Catechesis published by the USCCB calls all “people to a more effective integration of daily prayer in their lives, especially the ancient practice of praying the psalms and the Church’s Liturgy of the Hours, contemplation of the mysteries of the life of Christ through the rosary and a greater reverence of the Eucharist through adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.”

Worship involves not only participation in Sunday Mass but also the celebration of the sacraments. It is in participating in the sacraments and the sacramentals of Catholic life that credible disciples emerge. Keeping Jesus at the center of our lives finds its fullest expression in the Mass.

I am reminding all Catholics to attend Mass every Sunday. It is an obligation which carries the weight of serious sin to miss Mass on Sunday. If you have missed Sunday Mass, please bring this to confession before your next Sunday Mass. Also, do try to go another day or two if possible. It can be a very different experience — quieter and more focused. Some people even have the habit of attending every day. Try increasing your Mass attendance by even one Mass a week for a time, then add another one. You will be amazed at how your desire for Jesus increases! Regular Mass attendance strengthens our faith through the Scriptures, the Creed, other prayers, sacred music, the homily, receiving Communion and being part of a faith community. Invite someone to Mass — a personal invitation can make all the difference to someone who has drifted from the faith or feels alienated from the Church.

What brings joy is the love of Christ and the realization that we are a part of the glorious living Christ. We are a part of his mystical body and, therefore, we are never alone! We must not look upon Sunday simply as a day of obligation but as a day to celebrate the resurrection with joy. It is not a day to oppress us but to liberate us, as the Gospel of Mark reminds us that “the Sabbath was not made for man, but man for the Sabbath” (2:27). We must always celebrate Sunday Eucharist with the joy of Christ whom we encounter as the one who loves and saves us.
