Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: In both the gospel at the procession and the passion narrative, Jesus gives his disciples instructions that are striking in the specificity and which occur

just as he says. They find a donkey where they are supposed to; the bystanders allow them to take it. They follow a man carrying water and find the Upper Room waiting for them. Jesus continues to make predictions as he moves through the passion, like the shaking of the disciples' faith and the approach of Judas. In all this, Jesus seems to be in control, accepting calmly the horrific things that await him. Even as he prays from a place of deep sorrow, even as he pleads with God to "take this cup away," he accepts with steadfast courage what he is about to suffer. Jesus knows that the death that awaits him is not the end of his story. His faith in the God who gives life enables him to face his unthinkable torment.

To Experience: All of our own sufferings are wrapped up in the passion of Christ. His suffering was not in vain but rather became the source of abundant life for us. So our suffering, too, can be joined to Christ's. Every loss, every heartbreak, every physical pain can be transformed by God into a source of life. This is not to say that our pain no longer hurts, it certainly does. But Christ promises to be with us in that pain, so we are never left alone.


- What suffering have you gone through or are you going through? How can you unite that suffering to Christ's?
- How do you discern between suffering you are called to accept and suffering you are called to resist?
- Read the passion narrative with an eye out for all the unnamed side characters who help bring the story to life. If you were present at the passion, what role do you hope you would play?

Dear Brothers and Sisters.

Again we return to Holy Week with the celebration of "Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion." It's long and awkward to say, so usually we abbreviate it as "Palm Sunday." We need to balance both the jubilant and welcoming cheers of the crowds upon Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, and the loneliness of his death on the cross with only the companionship of two criminals. We are quick to welcome the Lord when times are good, but are steadfast in the face of challenges?

Usually the deacon or the priest proclaims the Gospel during the liturgy, but on two days every member of the congregation shares the Gospel: Palm Sunday and Good Friday. This emphasizes the fact that each of us takes a part in the judgment, suffering and death of the Lord. It was for our sins that he died. He suffered the punishment that we deserve for our sins. So, as we together proclaim the "Passion of the Lord" this Palm Sunday, we also examine our own hearts and lives.

When have I been like Judas, and sacrificed our principles and convictions, for the sake of gain and profit?

When have I been like Peter, rash to promise the Lord our loyalty but fall away when I am challenged? Being a faithful Catholic in today's world requires courage and conviction, but when have I let fear overcome my faith?

When have I been like the disciples in the garden, who are sleepy and drowsy in fulfilling their duties to the Lord? When have I been slothful in my prayers? When have I been neglectful of my religious duties?

Again, when have I been like Judas, who betrayed the Lord with a kiss? When have I given an outward show of piety, but in reality my heart has been far from God?

When have I been like the chief priests who judged Jesus? They could not convict him except by resorting to lies and distortions. Have I been honest and truthful?

Pilate knew the truth of the matter, and he knew what was right. Yet, he was swayed by the heckle of the crowds, and allowed pragmatism to triumph over what is right. When have I allowed social pressures to overwhelm my convictions about right and wrong, good and evil?

Simon helped Christ to carry his cross. In serving the poor, the weak, and the oppressed, we too help Christ to carry his cross. How have I responded to the call to serve the poor?

The centurion risked everything by boldly proclaiming, "Truly this man was a Son of God." Have I been willing to take a risk for the faith?

In response to the ways that I have shared in the Passion of the Lord, I can only respond with the prayer of the publican, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" (see Luke 18:9-14).


+T+ HELPING CHRISTIANS IN THE HOLY LAND The Pontifical Good Friday Collection



12 Ways to Make Holy Week More Meaningful

- 1. **THINK PRAYER.** If you have to work or go to school during Holy Week, think about how you can incorporate prayer breaks into each day.
- 2. **MAKE AN ADDITIONAL SACRIFICE** by fasting and abstaining from meat on Holy Thursday and Holy Saturday in addition to Good Friday.
- 3. DON'T WATCH TELEVISION from sundown on Holy Thursday until Easter morning.
- 4. GO to confession.
- 5. SET ASIDE 10 minutes every day to read Passion accounts in the Gospels.
- 6. Make it a point to **FORGIVE** someone on Good Friday.
- 7. PRAY the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary.
- 8. **OFFER UP** any pain or difficulties you experience during Holy Week and unite your sufferings with the pain of Christ.
- 9. PRAY the Stations of the Cross.
- 10. **ATTEND** all of the Triduum liturgies.
- 11. INVITE family members, friends and neighbors especially people who have strayed from the church to come to church with you.
- 12. **VOLUNTEER** to help decorate your parish on Holy Saturday for Easter.

Holy Week Customs



Palm crosses: From medieval times, people have believed that blessed palms formed into the shape of a cross would protect them from danger. The easiest way to make a cross from blessed palms is to cut two pieces of the palm, arrange in the shape of a cross, put a thumbtack in the middle, and attach the cross to a doorway or a bulletin board.

Coloring eggs: Decorating eggs was a pagan symbol of rebirth at springtime for the Romans, Greeks, Egyptians, Persians and even the Chinese. Christians adopted the colored egg as a symbol of new life which comes with the Resurrection.



Sweet breads: In many cultures, Holy Week was traditionally a time for baking sweet breads, cakes and pastries that would be served on Easter Sunday.

Easter lilies: The tradition of buying Easter lilies during Holy Week for use as decorations in homes and churches came into practice in the 1800s. The white flower is a symbol of purity and new life that heralds the resurrection of Jesus.



Holy Water blessings: Some families bring holy water containers to Mass on Easter so they can bring home some Easter water, which is blessed during the Easter Vigil, to bless their homes.

The Sacred Triduum



The word "Triduum" comes from the Latin word meaning "three days," and encompasses the three most sacred days in the Church year. It begins at sundown on Holy Thursday, reaches a high point at the Easter Vigil, and concludes with evening prayer at sundown on Easter Sunday. The liturgical celebrations during the Triduum on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, the Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday are rich with symbolism and flow from one to another in a seamless way. While it may appear as if these liturgies are separate and distinct, they are actually intended to be one continuous celebration that commemorates the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus. For this reason, Catholics are encouraged to observe the entire Triduum by attending all of the liturgies.

The Chrism Mass

During Holy Week bishops bless sacred oils in the diocesan cathedral at a special liturgy known as the Chrism Mass. The oil of chrism is used during baptisms, confirmation, ordination and the consecration of altars. The oil of catechumens is used at the Easter Vigil. The oil of the sick is used to anoint people during the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. The oils are then distributed to the parishes for sacramental celebrations throughout the year. As part of the liturgical reforms of Vatican II, the renewal of priestly promises was incorporated into the Chrism Mass. The Chrism Mass is an ancient celebration that traditionally takes place on Holy Thursday morning. But in recent years, many dioceses celebrate the Chrism Mass on an evening earlier in Holy Week so that more people can attend.
