# <u>Dates to</u> Remember



#### Thoughts for Today's Readings

**To the Point:** Few people understand the demands of watchful waiting like a woman in her last weeks of pregnancy. This waiting may look passive, but it is work. Both the extra weight her body carries and the

extra vigilance her mind bears are exhausting. Labor, like Jesus' coming, arrives when it will; there are ways to generally prepare, but the moment of its onset remains a mystery until it is upon her. There is one major difference: the physical demands of late pregnancy are such that many expectant women report that they are never not watching for labor to begin. It is far easier to forget to watch for Christ, which is why he reminds us so fervently in today's gospel to do so. But since watchful alertness takes a great deal of energy and can wear us down over time, we need to also take care to make our spiritual practices sustainable.

**To Experience:** Those who claim to be spiritual masters often enjoin us to "live in the present." There is a wisdom to this advice; becoming too caught up in looking ahead to the future can cause undue anxiety. But the things we hope for and wait for reflect something about who we are, and Advent is a time to look forward. This does not exclude living in the present though—looking for Christ's coming is not just about looking to the future but also includes seeking and finding it here and now, in the realities of our lives as they are actually lived.

- What are you waiting for? What hopes remain unfulfilled? What does that reveal to you about who you are and who God is?
- 2. How do you practice watchfulness in your spiritual life?
- 3. How can you make your practices of watchful alertness sustainable?
- 4. Who and what reveals God's face to you as you wait for the fulness of Christ's return?

#### Year of Mary October 1, 2022 to December 8, 2023



"At morn — at noon — at twilight dim Maria! thou hast heard my hymn! In joy and woe — in good and ill Mother of God, be with me still!" From Edgar Allan Poe's "Hymn to Mary"

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Part of my daily prayer is a Catholic devotion called the Angelus. It is traditionally prayed three times a day: at 6 a.m., 12 noon, and 6 p.m., accompanied by the ringing of the church bells. This devotion only takes a minute or two and consists of three verses from the Gospels, each followed by a Hail Mary, and a closing prayer. The verses narrate the Annunciation of the archangel Gabriel to Mary, her humble consent to God's will, and the Word becoming flesh and dwelling among us (see Luke 1:26-38 and John 1:14).


The Angelus is a simple and beautiful way to sanctify our day by pausing for a moment of prayer and remembering that "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life" (see John 3:16). As Pope St. John Paul II taught: "The Angelus invites us to meditate on the Mystery of the Incarnation, encouraging Christians to take Mary as a point of reference in the various moments of their day, so as to imitate her in her readiness to carry out the divine plan of salvation" (Pope John Paul II, General Audience on November 5, 1997).

By praying the Angelus, we contemplate the role of Mary as the Mother of God and our Mother. In this prayer, we join our voices with the angel who greeted Mary with the words: "Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with you" (see Luke 1:28). And we echo the words of Elizabeth, who exclaimed: "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb" (see Luke 1:42). We ask for the grace to follow Mary's example of obedience and surrender to God's plan for our lives as we pray: "Behold the handmaid of the Lord, be it done to me according to your word" (see Luke 1:38). And we implore the intercession of Mary, who is the "cause of our joy", to help us share in the glory of Christ's Resurrection as we pray: "Pray for us, O holy Mother of God, that we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ."

I heartily recommend the Angelus, especially as we prepare to celebrate the Birth of Christ on Christmas, the very day that "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us." Cards with Angelus on them will be distributed after Mass. It can also be found on page 273 of the Heritage Missal. It will be prayed after Communion during Advent and through the Christmas season.








#### Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary Feast Day: December 8

"The most Blessed Virgin Mary was, from the first moment of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege of almighty God and by virtue of the merits of Jesus Christ, Savior of the human race, preserved immune from all stain of original sin."

In 1854, Pope Pius IX's

solemn declaration, "Ineffabilis Deus," clarified with finality the long-held belief of the Church that Mary was conceived free from original sin. Mary was granted this extraordinary privilege because of Her unique role in history as the Mother of God. That is, she received the gift of salvation in Christ from the very moment of her conception.

Even though Mary is unique in all humanity for being born without sin, she is held up by the Church as a model for all humanity in Her holiness and Her purity in her willingness to accept the Plan of God for her.

Every person is called to recognize and respond to God's call to their own vocation in order to carry out God's plan for their life and fulfill the mission prepared for them since before the beginning of time. Mary's "Let it be done to me according to Thy Word," in response of the Angel Gabriel's greeting, is the response required of all Christians to God's Plan.

The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception is a time to celebrate the great joy of God's gift to humanity in Mary, and to recognize with greater clarity, the truth that each and every human being has been created by God to fulfill a particular mission that he and only he can fulfill.

"The word of the Lord came to me thus: "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I dedicated you, a prophet to the nations I appointed you." (Jeremiah 1:5-6)

#### St. Nicholas Feast Day: December 6

#### When is St. Nicholas Day?

St. Nicholas Day is celebrated on December 6. In 2023, this is on a Wednesday.

#### Who is St. Nicholas?

St. Nicholas was a bishop of an ancient Greek town called Myra, in present-day Turkey. He may have attended the first Council of Nicaea, where he is rumored to have punched Arius, a heretic, in the face. He was born around March 15, 270 and died on December 6. 343. St. Nicholas always had a

love for the poor and would work for their benefit. The story goes that there

was a poor man in town with no money for a dowry for his daughters. No dowry meant no marriage, which would have left his daughters to be sold into a life of servitude. Late one night, St. Nicholas dropped a bag of money down the chimney of the family home, thus allowing the daughters a dowry.

Most famously, he is the real-life historical figure from whom we get Santa Claus. His generosity inspired the "chubby and plump, a right jolly old elf" - Santa meaning Saint and Claus is short for Nicholas.

#### St. Nicholas Day Traditions

On December 5, the eve of St. Nicholas Day, children traditionally leave a shoe or a boot in front of the fireplace. The next morning the shoe is filled with small gifts, like coins, candy and oranges. The coins are given in remembrance of the coins St. Nicholas left the girls in need of a dowry and oranges are given to signify the gold that St. Nicholas gave away to those in need. This tradition comes from the legends of St. Nicholas' generosity and led to the celebration of Santa Claus on Christmas Day today. In some countries, like Germany and

Austria, St. Nicholas is accompanied by his counterpart the Krampus. Much like the legend of Santa Claus, the Krampus will leave coal in the shoes of misbehaving children. Children are encouraged to participate in acts of kindness to stay off of the Krampus' naughty list. In some countries people begin St. Nicholas Day celebrations with a parade. Many end their day with a celebratory meal. And since St. Nicholas is the patron saint of unmarried women, in Italy it's not just children who receive gifts.

One fun way to celebrate is to make traditional St. Nicholas cookies. In the United States gingerbread and sugar cookies are the most popular while in countries such as the Netherlands and Germany make spice cookies and peppermint cookies. The spice cookies are made into the shape of St. Nicholas - complete with a Bishop's mitre and staff!

Another tradition that is observed is to perform random acts of kindness on St. Nicholas' feast day. You could drop off a grocery store gift card to those in need, give books to your parish to use at Christmas, anonymously pay the utility bill of someone in need or donate gifts to local foster care programs. Spend time as a family brainstorming what you can do to serve your community just as St. Nicholas did when he was alive.


#### Who is St. Nicholas the Patron Saint of?

A patron saint is a saint who is known for praying for and helping people in specific walks of life or particular circumstances. Saints are typically patron saints of people, things and situations that were similar to experiences they had when they were alive.

St. Nicholas is the patron saint of children, bakers, brides, unmarried women, grooms, sailors and travelers. Because he was persecuted for his faith we can to pray for all people who are being persecuted around the world. He was a Bishop, so we can ask him to intercede for bishops. And he helped the poor, sick and suffering, so we can ask him to pray for those most in need in our communities.

The story of St. Nicholas is fun to know and a great way to remind us and our kids that Christmas is about more than just presents.
