Thoughts for Today's Readings

To the Point: Last week Peter answered Jesus' guestion correctly and was affirmed as a conduit of divine knowledge and received the delegation of divine pow-

er. But later in the very same conversation, he messes up. He hears of God's unthinkable plan for Jesus—one that involves a horrific and humiliating death-and he responds as any of us would if a friend started talking like that. He responds with loving protectiveness; but in this case, that is not the right response. God's logic is not our own, and here Jesus introduces the contradictory idea that saving our life causes us to lose it while giving up our life enables us to find it. Mystics reconcile this contradiction by pointing out that much of what we cling to is a superficial self that gives a false sense of what life is. By letting go of all that is not real or permanent, we find our true selves, which are at home with God.

To Experience: The crosses we are called to take up often seem small in comparison to Christ's. But Christ walks with us even in our smallest sufferings. Even mundane moments of irritation and struggle can become moments in which we practice virtue. We can follow Christ by responding to these frustrations with patience, fortitude, and empathy for others who are involved.

- How does Jesus' rebuke of Peter make you feel? Do you sympathize with Peter's stance?
- What crosses are you carrying? How could your community better support you in your struggle with them?
- Have you ever had an experience where self-sacrifice returned you to yourself? Has a hard choice ever brought you to deeper authenticity and self-knowledge?
- What about God's logic is hard for you to accept?

"Be still and know that I am God" Psalm 46:10

Dear Brothers and Sisters.

After the conclusion of the "Prayers of the Faithful," the gifts of bread and wine are brought forward and the priest prepares the altar for the celebration of the Eucharist. The preparation of the altar concludes with this exchange of prayers: The priest says, "Pray, brothers and sisters, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the almighty Father."

And the people respond, "May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and good of all his holy Church."

Notice that there are two parts of the sacrifice: the priest's part of the sacrifice and the people's part of the sacrifice. Both sacrifices are offered. Both sacrifices matter. What you bring to Mass to offer to God matters.

What's your sacrifice? The traditional "Morning Offering Prayer" teaches us what we can offer to God, "O Jesus, through the Immaculate Heart Mary, I offer you this day, with all its prayers, works, joys and sufferings...

As the priest is preparing the bread and wine, the people should be using their imagination to put their own sacrifices on the altar. What have you prayed for this week? Who have you prayed for this week? Place that on the altar. This is the place in Mass to offer to God our personal intentions. How have you worked this week? How have you served others this week? How have you lived out your vocation this week? Place all of that on the altar. What have you experienced in the past week as a blessing and a gift from God? Place that on the altar. What have you suffered this week? What we suffer is an invitation to share in Christ's Cross, and what we suffer should be placed on the altar.

With just a few moments of reflection, we can see that day-to-day life provides a rich offering to God. And this is what Saint Paul means in today's second reading, "I urge you brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God, your spiritual worship" (Romans 12:1).

Everything offered to God "in union with the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass" is received by the Father, transfigured, and returned to us as a rich blessing. The bread and wine are offered to God and returned to us as the Body and Blood of Jesus in the Eucharist. This is no less true with our "prayers, works, joys and suffering..." The more we bring to Mass, the more we get out of Mass.


St. Nazianz Area Seven Church Pilgrimage

The Story of the **Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary**

The Church has celebrated Mary's birth since at least the sixth century. A September birth was chosen because the Eastern Church begins its Church year with September. The September 8 date helped determine the date for the feast of the Immaculate Conception on December 8.



Scripture does not give an account of Mary's birth. However, the apocryphal Protoevangelium of James fills in the gap. This work has no historical value, but it does reflect the development of Christian piety. According to this account, Anna and Joachim are infertile but pray for a child. They receive the promise of a child who will advance God's plan of salvation for the world. Such a story, like many biblical counterparts, stresses the special presence of God in Mary's life from the beginning.

Saint Augustine connects Mary's birth with Jesus' saving work. He tells the earth to rejoice and shine forth in the light of her birth. "She is the flower of the field from whom bloomed the precious lily of the valley. Through her birth the nature inherited from our first parents is

changed." The opening prayer at Mass speaks of the birth of Mary's Son as the dawn of our salvation, and asks for an increase of peace.

Reflection

We can see every human birth as a call for new hope in the world. The love of two human beings has joined with God in his creative work. The loving parents have shown hope in a world filled with travail. The new child has the potential to be a channel of God's love and peace to the world.

This is all true in a magnificent way in Mary. If Jesus is the perfect expression of God's love, Mary is the foreshadowing of that love. If Jesus has brought the fullness of salvation, Mary is its dawning.

Birthday celebrations bring happiness to the celebrant as well as to family and friends. Next to the birth of Jesus, Mary's birth offers the greatest possible happiness to the world. Each time we celebrate her birth, we can confidently hope for an increase of peace in our hearts and in the world at large.

Ways to Celebrate Our Lady's Birthday

What better way to show your gratitude for this great gift than to celebrate Mary's birthday within your own day? Here are ten ways to start the party in your home or "on-the-go."

1. Incorporate Family Traditions

Growing up, my family had a special "celebration" plate which was only used on special occasions. For

our birthdays, it could always be found set at our place at the family table. For Christmas, we would use the plate to set an extra place at the table for Baby Jesus. It may be a tradition of hanging a "Happy Birthday" sign or decorating with balloons.

2. Dress in Blue

Use of the color was a tactic used by the artist to draw specific attention to that item or person. In a particular region, blue paint was expensive and scarce. It was only used in the most important of circumstances. Our Lady is often depicted wearing blue within sacred art. Wear something blue her feast days.

3. Bake a Cake

Be traditional! Bake a cake and eat it with family and friends in her honor. Make it as simple or complicated as you'd like!

4. Make a Donation

Find a trusted Marian organization (ie: Mary's Meals, a Carmelite order, etc.) and make a monetary donation in her honor as a birthday

5. Go to Mass

Mary says very little within the Gospels. Everything she does say directs all the glory and attention to her Son. She wants us to know and love Him. Thus, what better birthday gift to give to Our Lady than to go to Mass and receive her Son in the Eucharist?

6. Pray a Flying Novena

Typically a novena is said over the course of nine days. In the case of a flying novena, the Memorare is said nine times in a row calling on the intercession of Our Lady. Since Mary asks us often to pray for the conversion of sinners, pray a flying novena with this as your intention as a gift for her on her birthday. She would surely be grateful for this act of service.

7. Wear a Marian Medal

Become more aware of your own spiritual needs as well as the liturgical calendar.

8. Make a Pilgrimage

Visit the Marian statue within the church itself or on the church grounds. Spend some quality time in prayer with your mother. Pray a rosary as a type of birthday card. Pray the rosary as you participate in the Seven Church Walk on September 9.

9. Buy Some Roses

In almost every Marian apparition, Our Lady appears with roses. She's also revealed within numerous private revelations that her Heavenly crown is made of roses. In fact that's where the "Rosary" got its name. Buy a dozen roses in her honor and gift them to someone who could use a reminder of Heaven's love. Or take them with you on your "pilgrimage" and leave them at her feet.

We shouldn't feel silly for celebrating Mary's birthday—she's our Momma! Take some time to show Our Lady some love.

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
